Watch Potatoes for Bacterial Ring Rot

One of the diseases which causes: heavy losses to potato growers and a disease which is easily spread is Bacterial Ring Rot H N Racicot, Associate Plant Pathologist. Dominion Department of Agriculture, says that now-rethe time to be on the lookout for it and be urges growers to disinfeet second-hand or used bags in 1 pint of formalin in 30 gallons of water for 2 hours before using them as containers for your seed or your ring, rot free crop. If any potatoes in the crop have ring rot, dispose of all them and clean and disinfect celfar, bins, bags, tools, and machinery For warehouses, cellars and bins, spray with I lb bluestone in 10 gallons of water. For tools and machinery, spray or drench with the formain solution. A 2 per cent Lysol solution can also be used for disinfecting machinery Disinfect diggers. graders and all other implements that have been used on another farm; they may carry the ring rot bacteria. Do not bring small samples. of potatoes on to your farm without taking every necessary precaution, as such samples may have ring rot. Prospective purchasers or inspectors may cut some tubers for examination. Do not put back these cut tubers with the rost of the crop.
