BOYS' PARLIAMENT PLANNED FOR THE CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS

Plans have been launched for the holding of the 22nd Ontario Older Boys' Parliament in Toronto during the Christmas vacation. Last year the sessions of the Parliament were held in this county at Oakville and the representative from this county was Hartley Anderson who was chosen as Minister of Information in the Cabinet. It is hoped that the county will be represented again this year.

Mr. A. K. Leonard of Milton has been appointed returning officer for the county. Nominations may be received up to November 2nd. The voters' list closes Nov. 23rd and the elections, if necessary, are held Nov. 28.

The requirements for a candidate are that he be between 16 and 21 years of age, member of the church and ready to do his part in promoting boys' work in his constituency. Each organized group of boys should endeavor to have a candidate nominated as an election will be a training in voting and procedure regarding an election. Nomination blanks and any further information may be secured from your minister or from the returning officer.

The premier-elect is Mr. Graham Tipton of Toronto, a young man with an outstanding record of service in Boys' Parliament and in the work of his local church and Sunday School. The Leader of the Opposition is Mr. Robert Lederman of Kitchener who is a student at McMaster University.

The Boys' Parliament is sponsored by the Ontario Religious Education Council representative of six denominations and the Y.M.C.A. The parliament itself is a great training ground not merely in citizenship but in the actual leadership of groups.
