To Editors of Ontario Daily and Weekly Papers:

Sir:

On behalf of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture may I take the opportunity of disclaiming any responsibility for the chain letter, advocating voluntarily decreased farm production as a reprisal against certain government measures, which is being circulated throughout rural Ontario.

While we have disagreed frankly and at times emphatically with price control policies as enforced by the Dominion government and shall continue to do so, we at no time have contemplated such cheap and vexatious ways of gaining our demands.

The Ontario Federation has always co-operated with the government in efforts to increase efficient farm production and the Federation has done, and will do, everything within its power to assure Canada and the United Nations of an adequate food supply.

## Where Inflation Has Been Tried and Found Impossible

"My wedding ring cost eight million marks when I was married in Poland in 1924. We paid the minister 30 million marks for the wedding ceremony. My husband had to carry a large suitcase packed full of paper money for our honeymoon expenses. "I am terrified of inflation. When it comes it is almost worse than the battle-field, because there is nothing to die for and nothing to live for. "That is why I am interested in price control in Canada. And I am willing to do everything I can as a housewife to fight inflation here."

Mrs. S. Chaplik who is a liaison officer to Consumer Branch, W.P.T.B. made these remarks at a gathering of all-nation liaison officers whose headquarters are in the Ukraine, Holland, Jugoslavia, Hungary, Bulgaria, Denmark, Poland, China and Armenia.

## Just One Horse

She told the tragic story on a young Pole who had gone to America and returned to his native land years later with 700 American dollars.

"He thought he would be able to buy a small farm somewhere in Poland and retire. Farms were cheap when he went away. All he could buy with the \$700 transferred into marks was one horse. That was inflation after the last war," said Mrs. Chaplik.

## Swap Recipes

"European people can really economize," said Mrs. Pashka, Ukrainian Liaison officer, commenting on Canada's new Conservation Campaign. "We Europeans might be able to contribute something in the way of preparing various food dishes. And we could all swap recipes that make meat and butter stretch."

"I think it is a good idea to get women to understand there is a war on," Mrs. Pashka continued. "I think it would help if the women got together as we do here at Consumer Branch and discussed these shopping problems."
