Re Public Health

Commencing on the fifteenth day of May a thorough inspection of all premises, cellars, etc., within the municipality of Acton, will be made. Special attention will be given to assure outside toilets are properly cleaned. These must be cleaned prior to the above date and thoroughly disinfected. For this purpose chloride of lime is recommended. It is effective and inexpensive. Leaves or other rakings from lawns should not be left on the streets. Any rubbish not burned should be placed in suitable containers for removal by the Garbage Collector. Even if burned the ashes should be placed in containers for removal by the collector.
