This locomotive is hauling a precious cargo -crates of supplies for the armed forces, machine tools for war industries, shells and guns, and aircraft parts. Others, criss-crossing the land by day and by night, are moving troops to embarkation points, carrying servicemen on leave, bringing business men to key points for vital discussions on war production.

Today, the railroads of the nation are confronted with the task of handling twice the traffic of the last war with less equipment. The situation is aggravated by wartime restrictions on gas and As a result, Canadians are asked to avoid un not only outings, fishing trips, and pleasure week-ends, but visits to

relatives, holiday trips, and non-essential business journeys. An outstanding cause of travel dislocation is the convention, the number of which must-be drastically curtailed to help the railroads meet the demand for vital war service." To-day, there are no conventions-except those which are indispensable even in wartimewhich cannot be cancelled, postponed, or held with only local participants in attendance.
