TORONTO, (CP) — Urban Ontario appears to be on the move in an effort to aid the province's farmers but whether the amateur agriculturists from the cities and towns can completely overcome difficulties caused by a late spring and lack of experienced farm manpower remains to be seen.

Some "city folk" already have made their mark on the district farms, helping with the much delayed planting. Various organizations in urban centres are planning "farm commands" organizations to answer the call of the Dominion-provincial committee on farm labor for 500,000 persons to labor in the fields whenever they can—in the evenings, on days off or work-days and during their vacations.

Youth on the Job About 175 boys and 200 girls already are inhabiting Farm Service Camps. Provincial agriculture department officials state that 3,000 more boys are needed for these camps while 3,200 girls, already enrolled, will be placed as soon as camps are available.

Much seedling remains to be done next week when drive tractors are being sought in cities and towns. In some sections weather conditions prevented the sowing of oats and barley, but farmers in these areas are planning to sow millet and buckwheat for food. As a result more acres than usual are being sown to these food crops.

Indication of how organization of farm command brigades is being undertaken, is the City of Toronto's plan by which any person interested in helping is asked to report to a city firehall. Toronto residents are being urged to give up their spare time. Free transportation to and from district farms has been arranged and pay will range from 25 cents to 50 cents an hour, depending on the type of work. Churches, clubs and industries have been asked to aid in organization of these farm command groups.

No provincial government could solve all the problems of agriculture. Many such problems were in the Dominion's field. That was one reason he had consented to accept the leadership of the Progressive Conservative party, he said.

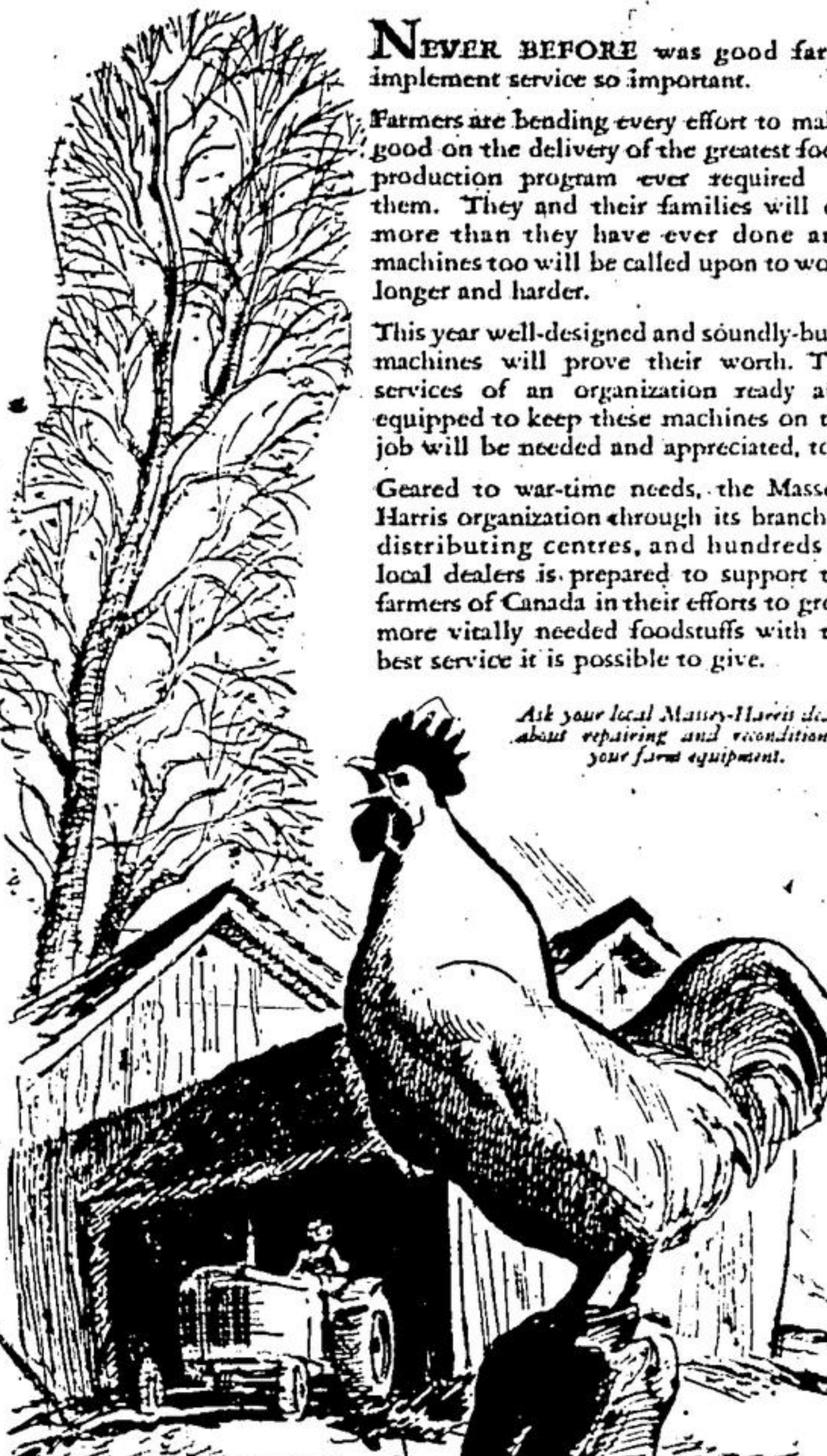
