Various organizations in urban contres are planning "farm commando" organizations to answer the call of the Dominion-provincial com mittee on farm labor for BOO, OND persons-to labor in the fields whenever they can -in the evenings, on days off or week-ends and during their vaca-

Watth on the Sab About 375 boys and 200 girls alroady are lubabiting Farm Service Camps. Brovingial agriculture depurtment afficiels state that 1100 more boys are meeded for these camps while 3,200 girls, already enrolled. will be placed as soon as camps are available.

Much seeding rouning to he done and men who can drive tractors are being sought in cities and towns. In some motions wenther conditions provented the seeding of onts and barley, but farmers in these areas are planning to sow millet and buckwheat for food. As a result neres than usual are being sown to these food erops.

Indicative of how organization of farm commando belgades de being undertaken, is the City of Toronto's plan by which any person interested in helping is asked to report to a city firehall. Toronto residents are being arged to give up their spare time. Free transportation to and from district farms has been arranged and pay will range from 25 cents to 50 cents an hour, depending on the type of work. Churches, clubs and industries thave theen asked to aid in organization of these farm commando groups.

Elmokett's Water Farmer John Bracken. Dominion leader of the Progressive Conservative party told a Huron County agriculture plenic crowd of 3,000 at Seaforth on Monday that a more equitable division of Canada's wealth would not be directed toward agriculture until the farmers "speak with united

Mr. Bracken said every one else is organized in Canada except the farmer. Once in a while the farmer had spoken in a feeble voice but many times he had falled to speak at all on issues of vital importance to this

No provincial government could solve all the problems of agriculture. Many such problems were in the Dominion's field. That was one reason he had consented to accent the leadership of the Progressive Conserentive party, he said.

Farguhar Oliver, provincial Minister of Public Works and Welfare urged that all farmers throw their support behind the Federation of Agriculture and make it a strong instrument in bringing their needs to light.
