Confirmation Service at St. Alban's Church

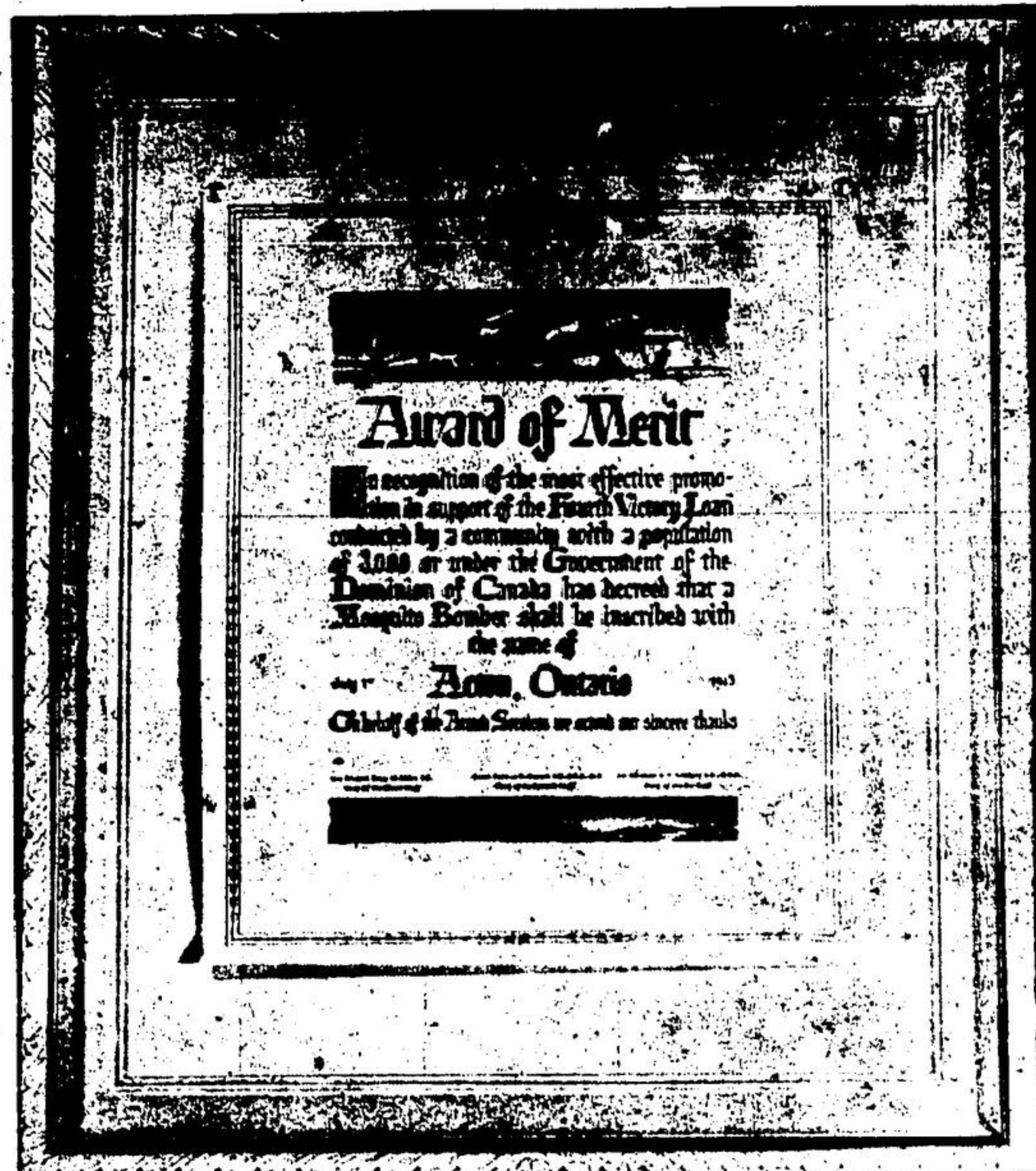
During a confirmation service last Sunday morning in St. Alban's church fifteen young people received the apostolic laying on of hands.
