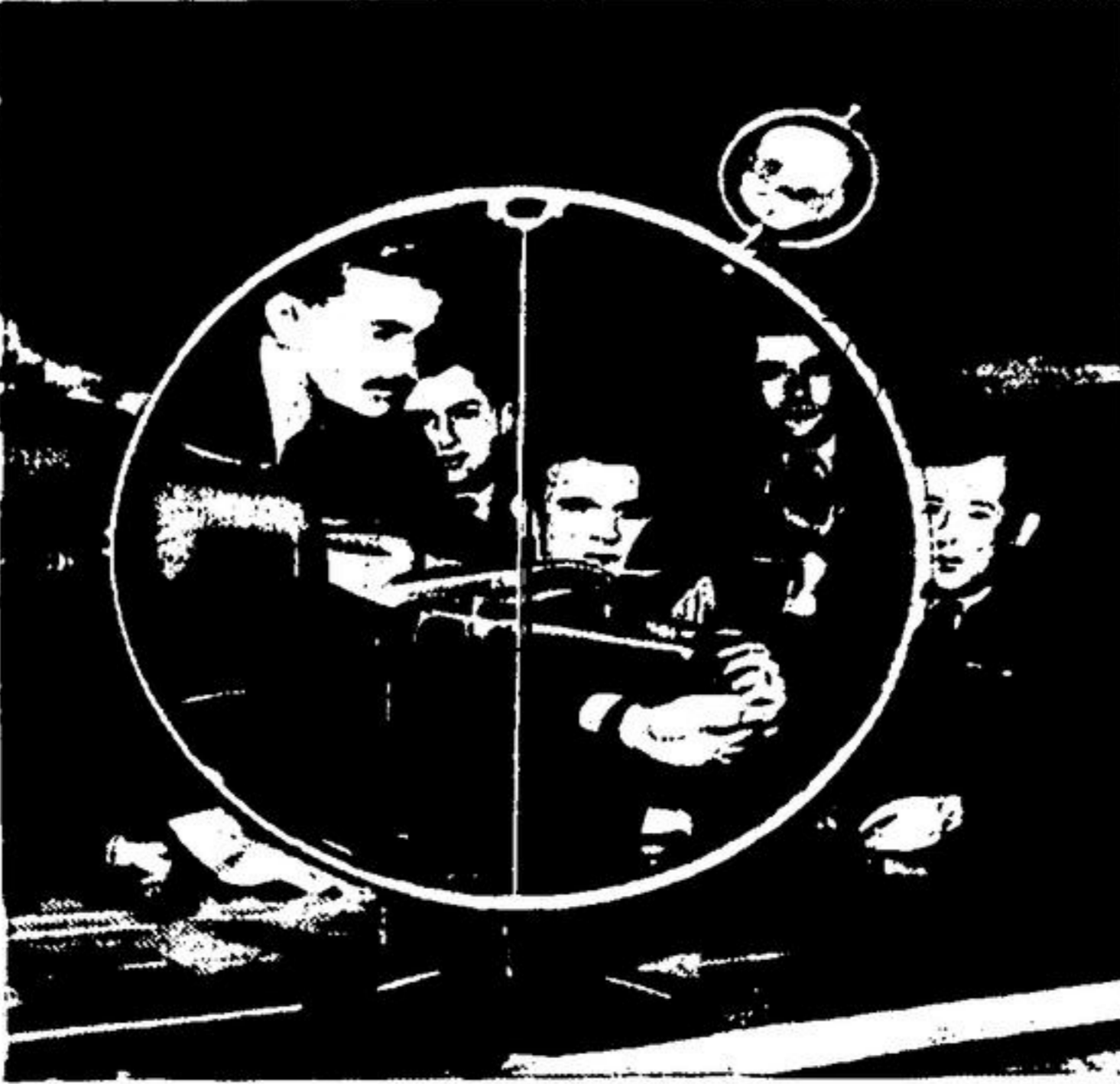
Mr. Charles McNally has secured a position in Mr. Clark's chopping mill in Georgetown.

Air University of The Allied Nations



At the Empire Central Flying School, in development of the famous Central Flying School whose advanced flying technique has been studied for over 30 years, senior U. K., British Commonwealth, U. S. A. and Allied instructors pool their knowledge and study the latest developments. They examine every angle of training and operational flying, making five classes of flight, instructional, on standard training planes; service, in operational planes; research, on training planes; examination, studying the work of flying schools, and finally "handling," testing the qualities of the latest operational aircraft.

Picture shows: Officers of the E.C.F.S. studying how air flows just an aircraft in flight. The model aircraft, mounted in front of a wind tunnel, can be tilted to various flight attitudes. The air flow over the wings is demonstrated by the behaviour of tufts of wool on their upper surfaces. The wind-turbine air-wortices are shown by the spinning of the small windmill held by the Australian Wing Commander.
