With thousands riding off Brooklin and ponying in Elgin, Ottawa, as against an indicated annual grain crop, the department of agriculture here has set up a subsidy on a sliding scale for southern farmers to buy western feed grain for storage against most winter feeding needs. Ottawa with a third subsidy per bushel for grains bought in July, 2½ cents in August, reaching 4½ cents each month to a subsidy of ½ cent per bushel in December.

When it is realized just our Canadian producers have got the job this year of supplying 35% of Great Britain's bacon requirements, it is important that their 3½ million ton, it emphasizes the tremendous job just being done on the farms from now to next.
