Michigan Nun Spending Summer Holidays Teaching Teachers How to Instruct Aircraft and Air Flight to Scholars

PRICE PRODUCTIONS SHOW BIG INCREASE

A general tightening in the enforcement of the wartime regulations governing prices and supply, has resulted in an increase of 62 per cent in the number of prosecutions during the past six months. Making the announcement, F. A. McGregor, enforcement administrator of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, said convictions had been registered in nine out of every ten cases entered for trial. The Board cracked down on violations of the price ceiling regulations, prosecuting in 791 cases, an increase of 476 over the preceding six month period.

"The importance of price cases is appreciated by the courts and is being more fully reflected in the fines levied," Mr. McGregor said.
