Michigan Dinu Shemink o Holidays Teaching Teachers How to Impart Aircraft and Air Flight to Scholars

WASHINGTON, (CP)--If you want to keep your children at home and happy, if you want them to be good citizens, then let them at those model nirplanes they love to build. That's the advice of the flying nun, Sister Mary Aquinas, who is spending this hot summer teaching teachers how to teach aviation to thousands of boys and girls this fall.

"Making model nirplanes is the first thing to come along in my time to develop student leadership and keep children at home," says this merry middle-aged nun, a teacher in Michigan parochial school.

As she pointed out a model glider, the first work of a nun who never before seen a model airplane klt, the ruddy-faced flyer chuckled, "American boys and girls don't expast a lot of knowledge from their teacher. They want an understanding attitude."

This teacher really has this attitude. It was so hot my cotton blouse stuck to the chair, but her students -two-thirds priests and nuns and the rest other public school teachersstayed to talk shop after class.

How It Started Sister Aguinas' was working away toward a major in physics at Notre Dame on a teaching fellowship : two summers ago. . Her students demanded aviation classes, but she organized n club instead until she could learn enough aviation to understand as

much as her pupils. South Bend, Ind., airport officials ndvised her the quickest way to learn aviation was to learn to fly. The next summer, while teaching at Manitowoe, Wis., she took dunl lessons with Sister Marie Paul. She added up ten and a half hours for a student licence. too. Returning to Michigan, she sponsored model plane contests and

Quite Simple "Flying is really very simple," declares the flying nun. "I wouldn't be afraid to take a plane up alone tomorrow-but I'd rather brush up on patterns and stuff."

She teaches structure, nerodynamics, engine assembly, meteorology, navigation, radio communication and air conditioning (warming up, not cooling off, she laughed).
