Marks of 40 per cent, meadt failure and 50 per centi a warning. If a girl in any exam, she was put back a week, or two and then tried again. Only two fallures were allowed.

Basic training for each category was bractically the same. The first: week, was devoted to "aircraft acquaintance." This included talks, lectures, history of flying types of aircraft used by the naval nir branch. airdrame pracedura and practice. flight: routine and explanation, of

neronautical terms. The next two weeks were spent: nequiring skill in the use of tools. Each girl was handed no tool box which she used throughout the course and which she took with her when

she was posted: The airframe mechanics learned to use hand and power-operated, drills. practised riveting, simple heat; treatment: and: filing. Engine mechanics learned; to file, saw, chip, drill; tap. how to use spanners and remove studs and nuts. The electricians and ordaunce recruits also began with elementary, training and with, the others passed to more difficult tasks.
