The Sunday School Lesson

FOR SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 13

THE SIN OF MOSES AND AARON Golden Text.—Be ye angry, and sin not. Eph. 4: 26.

Lesson Text.—Num. 30: 1-13. Read also 27, 28.

Time.—1453 B. C.

Place.—Kadesh in the Wilderness. Exposition.—1. The People Murmur Because of Lack of Water, 1-3.

The death of Miriam must have been a sad trial to Moses; she was his only sister and he loved much to her (ch. 26:29; Ex. 2:4, 7). She had been a prominent helper in the work (Ex. 15:20; Mic. 6:4). At first glance the people seemed to be in sore straits (v. 2). They went so far as to wish that they had died when God had visited their rebellious brethren with judgment (v. 3; ch. 11:3, 33, 34; 14:26, 37; 16:21-35, 49). Nothing can match the incredible ingratitude of God's people towards Him. They used the usual method when difficulties and dangers arose (ch. 14:5; 16:4; Ex. 17:4). In answer to their prayer "The glory of the Lord appeared unto them" (ch. 14: 10; 16:19, 42; Ex. 16: 10). What matter the complaint of the people when one can behold the glory of the Lord. Jehovah told them just what to do (v. 8). Again the rod, which had been in former days his shepherd's staff, but had been cast down before the Lord (Ex. 4: 2, 3) and into which God had consecrated His power because it was consecrated to Him (Ex. 2:17; 7: 20; 14:16; 7:5, 6, 9-11) became the instrument through which God honored Moses by making him the one through whom He should bring water out of the rock (v. 8).

III. The Sin and Unbelief of Moses and Aaron, 9-13.

Moses who had been so faithful under repeated trials now falls utterly. After leading the people forty years in the wilderness, he loses the privilege of leading them into the land. In the first two steps Moses did exactly as he was commanded (vs. 9, 10a) then he went his own way. There are three steps in Moses' failure. (1) He displayed arrogance and pride, calling the people "Ye rebels!" It was not for him to say this, especially in the spirit in which he did it, as he himself was about to meet a rebel against God. (2) The second wrong step was more serious, he took to himself the glory that belonged to God. He said, "Must we fetch you water out of this rock?" It is true that Jehovah had said, "Thou shalt bring them forth water" but it was only as God's instrument, and he should have given the honor to God.

Here is a point at which many a worker whom God has used falls and is consequently disgraced. He takes to himself the honor that belongs to God, he fails to recognize and acknowledge himself as merely the instrument while God is the real worker. In doing this, Moses failed to sanctify Jehovah. (Contrast Gen. 40: 8; 41:16; Dan. 2:28-30; Ac. 3:12-16; 14:9-15; 1 Cor. 3:7.) (3) Moses smote the rock when God had bidden him "speak" to the rock. This was an act of unbelief, for it showed a doubt that merely speaking to the rock would bring forth the water and it was an act of disobedience. The servant of God should always do exactly what God tells him and not seek to improve upon God's commandments (Lev. 10: 1; 1 Sam. 15:13, 14, 19, 24; 1 Ki. 13:21-24; 1 Chron. 13: 9, 10; 15:2, 13; Matt. 23:20). On a former occasion God had bidden Moses to smite the rock (Ex. 17: 5, 6) but the rock was a type of Christ (1 Cor. 10:4) and Christ was to be smitten but once, after that a mere word of prayer would bring forth water from the rock that had been smitten once for all (Luke 11:13). When any man gets to the place where he thinks he is essential to God's work, God sets him aside and appoints another. Every worker needs to lay this lesson to heart. Moses and Aaron fell through unbelief (v. 12). The one road to honor and blessing is faith (2 Chron. 20:20; Isa. 7:9; Matt. 17:20; Luke 1:20, 45). Moses very reluctantly gave up the honor of leading the people into the land, but God's decree was irrevocable (Deut. 3:23-26; 32:49, 50; 34:4).
