The glossy plumage so characteristic of the maturing pullet about to lay her first egg is a sure sign of a healthy condition, observes W. T. Scott, Head Poultryman, Dominion Experimental Station, Harrow, Ont.

This condition of feather is the indication of good feeding and management. Poor condition or ragged con family in their recent bereave- feathering may be the result of one or more circumstances. Errore feeding, disease, lice, bad ventilation, or over-crowding may be responsible.

The loss of lustre and a general lifeless condition is the outward and visible sign of lack of condition. A good hen may lay and shed feathers at the same time during the moult, but generally she is in a decline and a loss of production and body weight

may be expected. Chief among the common errors of feeding is the supply of too much whole grain without sufficient mash and green feed roughage. The result is a badly balanced diet seriously deficient in minerals and proteins.

The approximate daily feed requirement for a hen in moderate production is four ounces plus all the green feed she will eat. Of this amount the scratch grain portion should approximate two ounces. Under the pressure of high production the additional feed required may be taken from the constant supply of the dry mash.

When dry and rough feathering indicates the first signs of lack of condition, it is generally advisable to keep the supply of succulent green feed plentiful, and by weighing the total of scratch grain and mash consumed to adjust the scratch grain to suit the conditions and the number of birds in
