ENGLISH BLACKBERRIES GET STIFF PENALTIES

They deal harshly with black marketers in England. The head of a London firm was recently sent to jail for three years and fined \$45,000 for distributing sugar illegally and selling sugar, butter, cocoa and dried eggs above maximum prices. Another company was fined \$10,000 plus \$500 costs for buying these products at prices higher than the maximum.

"You have committed acts of treachery against your country," defendants were told by the court. "Every act of this kind weakens the Allies in their battle against Fascism."

LOOSE MEXICAN ORANGES NEW TO MONTREAL TRADE

Oranges from Mexico shipped loosely in cans and not in the traditional crate, recently arrived at the Montreal fruit and produce market, a subsidiary of the Canadian National Railway, provided a new experience for the local trade. It was the first arrival at the terminal of fruit shipped in that manner. To market the fruit the oranges were placed in bushel baskets and promptly purchased by retailers to whom any fruit is welcome in this season of shortages.
