Notice to Parents

Parents are kindly requested to warn their children against wilful damage to property of others, such as breaking windows, defacing or tearing down signs, destroying fences, gardens, etc. Also to keep the children constantly reminded that such acts are not to be perpetrated if prosecutions in Magistrates' Court are to be avoided.

It should be clearly understood that fines imposed upon children for these and other offences have necessarily to be paid by the parents plus the cost in most cases of repairing the damaged property.

Some boys make themselves a nuisance by ringing door bells at night, especially where aged persons reside, while other boys have gone so far as to stone persons travelling along the highway. Air guns also are a real danger and are not to be sold or given to or carried by any boy under the age of 14 years not being the holder of a permit.

In such matters as these I ask for the full co-operation of all Parents and also the teaching staff in schools in bringing about an improvement in the conduct of boys who have hitherto indulged in any of these unlawful acts.
