New Ferry, Cheshire, England (CP)—Letters came often to Pte. Leo Campbell of the Gloucestershire Regiment during the three years he was a prisoner of war in Germany.

Friends wrote to tell him of affairs in his home town during raids on the Mersey side. His sister wrote to say their own home had been hit. His mother was here and hoped he was well. Leo wondered why she didn't write.

He found out where he was repatriated recently. She was blinded by a German bomb early in 1942 and insisted on keeping it a secret from her son.
