British Women Proud of Their Work with Royal Navy, Successfully Replace Men in Variety of Jobs

LONDON (CP)—A ship on the Thames, moored just below St. Paul's is as close as some Wrens get to going down to the sea in ships.

Their job isn't very exciting or romantic, on the H.M.S. Chrysanthemum or aboard The President, but the Wrens who do the jobs are very proud of being an integral part of the British Navy.

A Due to Admiralty regulations it isn't possible to give the girls who do these jobs their names—but most of them were typical anyway of the chipper, neat and scrubbed young women who wear the navy blue in this country.

Interested Ships The ships themselves are interesting places. On the decks and down below, merchant seamen learn to man guns, to float barrage balloons, to identify aircraft.

On the lower deck of the Chrysanthemum some seamen were laying out their kit, getting ready to go to sea and two pretty Wrens in the ship's slot were handing out replacements for lost articles to them.
