

and also farm operators. 4. "MALE EMPLOYEE" includes all male persons working for

and commercial employers. A return post card hab gone to farm operators. 6. If you employ any male person, and have not been notified of

the survey by booklet or post card, contact the nearest Employ-ment and Selective Service Office and ask for the buoklet. 7. Workers in agriculture, of military age, who have not been rejected by the Army and who have not a Postponement Order should apply for such order to the nearest Registrar immedi-

2. Obligation to make the examination rests on each and every employer of male persons, and employers must act.

3. Prositice are provided for failure to carry out this examination, and for male employees failing to assist by refusal to produce documents.
