

## The Week at OTTAWA

**OTTAWA** (CP)—Labour Minister Miltier's announcement that the Department of Commerce had decided that the Undersecretary of Industries and Commerce, Sir Alexander Galt, would be responsible for overseeing the other federal departments charged with economic planning, makes it clear that sustainable development of the economy has been endorsed by government. It also indicates that the government is not afraid to face up to its responsibilities.

Government has been given a certain measure of control over Canada's war economy by the new legislation, which now requires all major contractors to submit their costings to government for a general review before they can submit their services to the market by themselves or by other contractors.

This review of Canada's manpower requirements, while it did nothing to restrain the labour department, nevertheless throughout the year of 1943, brought about a general restraint of manpower by the means of the use of the freeze and industry.

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Formation of a special committee comprising ministers in Winnipeg has served to redirect public attention to the seriousness of the situation in Canada's northern centres, where shortage of accommodation is acute.

"Toronto only recently, represented by Fred Gandy and Controller (deputy) Saunders, placed before Secretary of State (Industry) and Munitions Minister Hale, and Munitions Minister, Simeon suggestion that vestments to existing leases be granted in cases where the need for accommodation does not exceed 10 per cent. of present rental rates, and present rental regulations would not be changed.

Miguel Gandy and the members of committees in Toronto have immediately concerned over the plight of agriculture's workers, who in many instances lack the funds to buy houses for themselves, and he decided that about 300 per cent. of an estimated 12,000 families facing eviction upon the expropriation of leases were in the dependent on minimum wage armed forces.

Defence Minister Blatch announced subsequently in the House of Commons that the government proposed to take steps to provide houses for the families of those in the services.

Through Col. Ulrich, Blatch informed details of the plan, his reference to the fact that certain houses built under the War-time Housing Act have in special instances been administered by civic and municipal authorities, so whom the dwellings have been allotted for the benefit of service men, independent of talent to indicate that the government may embark upon considerable extension of this method of covering housing shortages.

The speech from the throne opening the present session of parliament forecast the enactment of housing legislation to extend existing provisions.

**Grain "90" decreases**

Winter grainers, whose production last year produced 135,000,000 pounds of vegetables—the crop of 120,000 winter grainers in Canadian cities with populations of more than 10,000—have asked not to restrain their hauls.

The agriculture department has announced that wartime grain bins be extended this year, since there will be no ready demand for all produce within market grainers' market.

Grain will have to get on without its bins, under a new law. Prime Minister Mackenzie King has issued a general令 for the meeting of prime ministers of all dominions.
