What More Homes in Acton Mean

One of the things that homes in Actes would mean would be an enjoyment of increased facilities at a lower cost to every propcety owner. Supposing 50 new homes were erected with an average assessment of \$2000 , cack. That would mean an increased aspresent of \$100,000. An increased assessment means more taxes in the general fund without a cor-

responding increase in costs. For instance, garbage cellection will cost no more if 50 new homes are added. Pelice and fire protection costs will not be increased. The Town Hall will still look after and other debentures will not east m cent more. Most of the services provided from the tax funds are adequate for increased service. True, there will be water and other extensions of existing services, but the advantage is all with those owning properties in a larger com munity.

Acton is fortunate that most of the facilities enjoyed by cities are now provided. Most of them are so nearly paid for that the one yet to come will make no added burd-
