(Continued from Page Three) "It would be a mistake to underestimate the serious character of this form of attack," the Prime Minister said.

On Sunday it was announced that British and Canadian troops had taken Caen and the Canadians went on to secure another victory, taking the towns of Beccrell and Louvigny south of the shattered city.

Meanwhile there were hints from Ankara that Turkey may be considering joining into the war. Reports reaching London pictured the Turkish capital as seething with diplomatic activity in which both British and Russian were taking an important part.

Toronto's Mayor Conboy has warned of an approaching housing crisis in the city which he says is of "unbelievable danger."

All over Ontario resort owners are doubling up, turning rooms for two into accommodation for four.

Most of the holidayers are Canadians but an increasing number of Americans are coming to Ontario this year, reports T. H. McNally, of the Toronto Convention and Tourist Association.

Criticism of the Ontario government for alleged failure to implement the 48-hour week legislation in the province brought an answer from acting premier T. L. Kennedy. He said

the act now is in effect but it must be borne in mind that because of the critical labor shortage, some firms families already seeking winter shelter.

An aerial survey is underway with a view to revitalizing the principle source of livelihood for Indians in the fished-out commercial sturgeon beds of Northern Ontario lakes.
