REACHES CLEARLY

The Toronto Globe and Mail of August 22nd published a news item a complete statement of Canada's Armed Forces by Jimmies and then a couple of days later appeared an editorial which hardly qualified the facts about Quebec.

No one dignifies the Spanish (Canada) problem more than I do, but I suggest that during the stress of war it is no time to either aggravate it or attempt to cure the problem.

The following are the official figures of Quebec's armaments:

Davy 31,000

Air Force 32,000

Army 30,000

All of the above have enlisted for service overseas. While this total is little more than half of what it should be to equal the record of the rest of Canada, yet it is a substantial force. When war came we did not create the problem. It was already there, and we have simply done the best we could under the circumstances. While problem of two races and two languages must be courageously tackled when the war is over. This country has a record of which all Canadians should be proud and I believe that a standard Canadian History Book should be taught in all schools across Canada would be of great assistance. While it is true that Great Britain did conquer France, Canada did it equally true that all people in this country have been treated fairly and no one has been oppressed. The suggestion made by the R.C.D.C. that both languages should be taught in all of our schools is I believe a logical suggestion.

In response I should add that the Montrealers are not all from French Canada. Ontario has 421,000 compared to Quebec's 261,000 and it would further be added that 271,000 of Ontario's citizens went and only 6,000 in the Quebec districts.
