IN CASE YOU ARE INTERESTED

The Toronto Globe and Mail of August 23rd published as a news item a complete statement of Canada's armed forces by Jacques and then in a couple of days later appeared an editorial which badly spoiled the facts about Quebec.

No one disputes the French Canada problem more than I do, but I suggest that during the stress of war is no time to either aggravate it or attempt to cure the problem.

The following are the official figures of Quebec's enlistments: Navy 11,649 Air Force 10,170 Army 14,024

All of the above have enlisted for service overseas. While this total is little more than half of what it should be to equal the rest of Canada, yet it is a substantial force. When war came we did not create the problem. It was already there, and we have simply done the best we could under the circumstances. This problem of two races and two languages must be courageously tackled when the war is over.

While it is true that Great Britain did conquer French Canada it is equally true that all people in this country have been treated fairly and no one has been oppressed. The suggestion made by the Globe, that both languages should be taught in all of our schools is I believe a helpful suggestion.

In fairness it should be said that the Zombies are not all from French Canada. Ontario has 1,040 compared to Quebec's 41,900 and it should further be added that 7,000 of Ontario's draftees went active and only 6,000 of the Quebec draftees.
