# THIS WEEK

**TORONTO (CP)**—The Family Allowances Act and its possible effect on Ontario's political situation was up for animated discussion this week.

In an address over a Canadian Broadcasting Corporation provincial network Sept. 12, E. R. Jolliffe, C.C.F. leader in Ontario, charged Premier George Drew with "trading the flag of provincial isolationism" by his criticism in a radio speech Aug. 9 of the Family Allowances Act.

Mr. Jolliffe described the premier's opposition to the act as a "phony" issue to divert the public's attention from his own record and bring on an early election "if possible before the troops come home."

On his Aug. 9 speech, Premier Drew said his government would do everything within its power "to see that the recently-passed bill does not go into effect."

He said the Ontario government had made an agreement with the federal government whereby the Dominion took over collection of certain taxes to be used for war purposes and "it would not be possible for the Dominion government to pay baby bonus . . . without continuing to occupy the fields of taxation vacated by the provinces only for the purpose of permitting the Dominion government to wage total war."

Mr. Jolliffe said the premier had deliberately raised an issue upon which he knew the government was certain to be defeated if it came to a vote in the House next session.

The C.C.F. Opposition, however, was prepared to form a new government in Ontario if called upon, Mr. Jolliffe said the C.C.F. would "continue to support whatever progressive measures may be introduced by the government."

But "we shall oppose Mr. Drew's policy of provincial isolationism whatever the consequences may be."

Following Mr. Jolliffe's statement, Harry Nixon, Ontario Liberal leader, said his statement of several weeks ago that he "would use every means in my power" to see that the federal family allowances bill becomes effective "still stands."

He described as "too hypothetical" a question as to whether the Liberal party would co-operate with the C.C.F. in the event the latter group were called upon to form a government if Mr. Drew's party were defeated on the allowances issue.

During a rally Sept. 13 of the Youth Labor Federation here, Mrs. Ruth Caron, national executive secretary of the Federation, said sections of Canada which stirred up feelings against French Canada during the recent election were only forcing French Canada into greater isolation.

She said people in the rest of the Dominion should realize instead of the conditions were forcing French Canadians to join the Bloc Populaire and similar movements and that improved conditions would be a great factor in leading to more liberal and progressive ideas on the part of Quebec's population.
