**Novel Display Booth Feature at Acton Fair**

Food prices under Price Control and new Re-Make hints will be illustrated by a novel grocery display and a re-modified clothes exhibit at the Acton Fair, September 22, 23, in a booth set up by members of the Acton Consumer Branch committee of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. Consumer Branch exhibits will pay particular tribute to "Mrs. Canada" for paying no more than ceiling prices for conserving food and clothing, co-operating with storekeepers, observing ration regulations and buying only what she really needs. The re-make exhibit will encourage women to make-over and make-do by showing them with real re-makes and photographs something of the art of re-modelling the family's clothes in line with this year's fall and winter styles. Booklets giving specific pattern numbers and tips on ripping, re-styling, re-cutting, will be distributed by Consumer Branch representatives at the Fair. "Help Keep Prices Down" is the theme for the grocery display which illustrates food prices to-day under price control and food prices under the inflationary period following the last war. For \$6.30 in 1920 a shopper could buy 15 lbs. of sugar and 24 lbs. of flour. To-day for the same money the housewife can buy the 15 lbs. of sugar and 24 lbs. of flour plus 1/4 lb. tea, 1/4 lb. coffee, two boxes of cereal, six cans tomato soup, tin of floor wax, one box soap flakes, three cakes laundry soap, one jar marmalade, one loaf of bread, six cans of vegetable soup, one pound of cocoa, 33 oz. vinegar, one package baking powder, two packages of corn-starch.
