Espeying Council Passes By-Laws At October Meeting

Lower interest on Alberta Bank is accepted by Council—Insurance coverage is increased

The October meeting of the Espeying Township Council was held in the Council Chamber on Monday afternoon. All members of the Council were present and Reeve May presided.

Accounts passed for payment were Bell Telephone, services, \$432; Acton Public Utilities Commission, street lights, 25.00; Board of Hydro Commissioners, street lights, 12.50; Dept. of Health, insulin, 32; A. W. Benton, stamps, 8.00.

Moved by Wilson and Currie that relief accounts as presented by the Relief Officers be paid \$27.50.

A by-law to assess the several School Sections and Union School Sections for 1944 was read as required and passed.

Another by-law passed at this meeting was one empowering the collection of rates to collect penalties for non-payment of taxes.

Moved by Murray and Wilson, that the Treasurer be authorized to accept \$11.25 in payment of the six months interest coupon due October 1st, 1944, for \$22.50 on Bond No. 3772, Province of Alberta, for \$1,000 held of the Railway Bond Fund.

Moved by Wilson and Currie, that relief accounts as presented by the Relief Officers be paid \$260.12—Carried.

Moved by Currie and Murray that the General Accident Assurance Company, (George C. Brown Agent) be paid for Township Road Liability Insurance for the year ending October 1st, 1943, to be increased to \$25,000.00 P. L. and \$5,000. P. D. Premium \$78.00—Carried.

STELLA (BENNETT) CONOVER, Susan Bennett, wife of Edmund Conover passed away on October 19th at the Western Hospital in Toronto.

She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bennett and her early life was spent at their farm home on the fifth line of Elm Township. Her childhood ambition of being a trained nurse was never realized but much of her time was spent in capably nursing those of her own who sadly needed her and she was one upon whom many depended when in trouble.

She married Edmund Conover and went to live on the Dundas Highway near Elmville. Here, as in her former home she was always a friend in need, and the large number of floral tributes bore testimony to the place she held in the hearts of all there.

The funeral services were held at the family residence on Saturday, October 19th and were conducted by her pastor, the Rev. Mr. Lovings and Mrs. Lovings sang the beautiful hymn, "There is No Night There".

She was the second youngest of a family of twelve of whom Mrs. Wm. Bingham of Acton and Isaac of Georgetown survive.
