British Preparing For Pottery Export

Exotic Designs Feature Dinner and Tea Services For Dominion LONDON (CP) — British factories have prepared the designs for pottery they intend to sell in the Dominions after the war—exotic designs as a changeover from the wartime utility patterns. Dinner and tea services from Britain will suggest the luxury of the mandarin's palace and the floral beauty of a richly-embroidered Chinese shawl. "There are two types ready for export," said one manufacturer. "There are vivid colors with novel effects; and there are traditional designs, influenced by the colorful and delicate floral patterns seen on heavy silks, satins and brocades in the Far East. "Even motifs and borders of Chinese carpets and rugs, as well as rich silk shawls exquisitely embroidered, have furnished inspiration. "Canada, Australia and South America want to see as much of our pottery, showing the new form of boral design, as we can let them have when we start exporting—after controls are removed." One sample plate he demonstrated had scattered groups of delicate flowers in soft rose, vivid blue-green and light yellow. Contrast was a plate decorated with a typical English country scene.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO, Oct. 24th (CP)—The present and future of municipal affairs in Ontario were discussed and planned at Toronto during the week at the annual conference of Ontario mayors and reeves, attended by 80 delegates from all parts of the province.

The meeting ended on a significant note sounded by Premier Drew that it would be necessary for the three levels of government in Canada—municipal, provincial and federal—to get together on post-war planning. Urging such a conference in an address before the association, Mr. Drew said, "It is the only way we can plan for full employment after the war. There are great opportunities which will be held back unless the administrative functions of government are defined."

Other ideas propounded before the delegates included the suggestion of K. Grant Crawford, director of the Institute of local government at Queen's University, Kingston, for a "carefully thought-out and properly-executed plan of publicity" as a means of developing citizen interest in community affairs and in warding off the dangers of "centralization" of government.

Conference chairman Mayor Fred Conboy, Toronto, Joseph Meindinger of Kitchener, Stanley Lewis of Ottawa's Charles Lamb of Lindsay and W. Garfield Case of Owen Sound were appointed a committee on federal-provincial-municipal affairs to make representations in connection with resolutions adopted by the conference. These resolutions concerned taxation of government-owned public utilities, a federal government policy on civil aviation and other matters relating to Ontario's municipalities. George Inglis of Niagara Falls was chosen president of the Association.

Toronto was host to another big conference, the annual meeting of the Trades and Labor Conference of Canada. President Percy R. Bengough in his opening address said that a brighter future of Canada was more than a dream if the same determina-

tion were applied in peacetime that had been shown by the Canadian people in this war.

The Congress president said his organization was pleased with the action of the federal government in establishing a reconstruction department under Munitions Minister Howe.

Premier Drew addressed the labor men Monday and said no labor legislation in Canada was more advanced than that upon the statute books of Ontario. He believed it safe to say that Ontario's labor minister, Hon. C. Daley, had introduced more legislation for the advantage of labor during the present war "than in any one year since confederation, and urged co-operation between representatives of government, labor, management and agriculture in making the post-war future.

A dean among Canadian weekly newspapermen died Saturday at his home at Collingwood, Ont. He was David Williams, 75, first honorary life member of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association and editor of Collingwood's weekly newspaper, the Enterprise-Bulletin, for the last 43 years. Born in Perth County, he was a former mayor of Collingwood. In 1941 Mr. Williams was chosen from among weekly newspaper editors of Canada to receive the honorary degree of doctor of laws from the University of Toronto.

BURLINGTON

During the past few days soldiers stationed at the Farm Service Camp on Water Street, have been helping growers in the district harvest their celery crop.

At the regular meeting of the water commission, held on Friday evening last, a conference was held between the members and Ed. Sherwood on whose farm it is proposed to place a town reservoir. It was agreed that three independent men be named to arbitrate and set a price on the land needed.

At the regular meeting of the town council held on Friday evening last, Mayor Blair asked the members to give thought to the immediate necessity to the appointment of an "area forming commission," which might be termed or named "Burlington Rural Metropolitan Area Commission."—Gazette.
