Young People's Rally for Halton Held in Milton.

Two Hundred from All Parts of Presbytery Hear Rev. A. R. Graham of India.

"Juvenile delinquency is due to the fact that in the crisis of life, we have nothing to hold us," declared Rev. A. Russell Graham, a missionary on furlough from India, at a Joint Halton Presbytery Rally of Young People and Adults here in St. Paul's United Church last Friday evening.

Mr. Graham emphasized the fact that it was costly to be a Christian in India to-day. In fact, new converts were being persecuted in a fashion similar to that of the Early Christians. One couple was deprived of seventy-five acres of land and had their crops destroyed by the landlord and neighbors; but when the missionaries offered sympathy, the timid little wife pointed to her heart and said: "I've got something here that they will never take."

Of the almost two hundred who attended the Rally, over half were young people who before the meeting opened, enjoyed a half-hour period of recreation and a sing-song in the Sunday School Room. Meanwhile Mr. Graham was addressing the adults in the Church Auditorium on "The Political Situation in India To-Day."

At the close, a social period was held in the Sunday School Room where light refreshments were served by the St. Paul's Y.P.U., with Misses Donna June Hutchinson, Margaret Alexander and Jean MacNabb being the members of the Committee in charge.

JOHN CUTTING John Cutting, resident of this district for nearly 80 years, was laid to rest in Everton Cemetery Monday afternoon. Rev. James C. Grier, minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, conducted the services, held in the McLamaghan and Beag funeral home. Mr. Cutting died Saturday, November 11, at the Guelph General Hospital. Although 79 years old, he had been ill but one week when his death occurred.

Native of Erin, Ontario, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Cutting. Until about 20 years ago, he had farmed in Erin, moving to Erinamora at that time. After about ten years in Erinamora, he retired from farming, moving to Guelph to reside at 8 Glasgow Street South.

Surviving are his widow, the former Luella Welch of Michigan; a daughter, Mrs. William Owens, Erinamora; two brothers, Edward and Geo. both of Hespeler and four sisters, Mrs. Mary Holliday, Orton, Ontario; Mrs. Sarah Robertson, California; Mrs. Harry Shingler, Hespeler; Mrs. John Daly, Guelph.

Funeral services were held at the Guelph General Hospital, Guelph, on Saturday, November 11, at 10 o'clock. Burial was in the Guelph Cemetery. The Rev. James C. Grier officiated. The casket was borne by the Guelph City Band.

THIS WEEK

The long-standing question of civil marriage for Ontario came to the forefront again during the week. From United Church and Church of England sources came reports that the question had been revived and Attorney-General Leslie Blackwell said that immediate careful consideration would be given by the Ontario government to any representations from church bodies concerning civil marriage.

Ontario and Quebec are the only provinces in the Dominion which have no civil marriage ceremony. The question has arisen many times in the past but no concrete action has ever been taken.

Rev. Cannon W. W. Judd, secretary of the Church of England's Social Service Council, said most of the Ontario dioceses of his church were on record in favor of a form of civil marriage. Rev. F. W. Bradley of Toronto said that the United Church had discussed the situation and Rev. Gordon Siscoe, secretary of the United Church of Canada, said that "it is my judgement that the United Church would favor a civil form of marriage for those who do not approach marriage with a sense of religious obligation."

Two leaders in the political and financial fields believe Canada's war-born industrial expansion must be fully-used and she must seek export trade if she is to prosper after the war.

S. M. Webb, president of the Canadian Bankers' Association, said at Toronto that returning to the dimension of 1939 was "unthinkable," and that great stimulus would come from post-war development of trade and employment in business and industry were reasonably sure of fair profits. He said the democratic world could not suddenly scrap the system of free initiative and look to a "utopia brought about over night."

Later in the week at Brockville, provincial C.C.F. leader E. B. Joffe said Ontario would be hardest hit among the Canadian provinces unless industry was established on a basis of full production after the war. Addressing a nomination convention at which Air Vice-Marshal A. E. Godfrey was chosen C.C.F. candidate for Leeds County, Mr. Joffe claimed the C.C.F. party was the only one prepared to mobilize Canada's resources to "win the peace."

Farmers in some Ontario rural sections who are still without the modern aid of electricity may soon find it available to them. Agricultural Minister T. L. Kennedy, said in a speech at Guelph, that Ontario is ready to put in effect its plan for complete electrification of rural areas and extension of present Hydro power lines will be made as soon as possible. More than 10,000 new rural consumers—of whom more than 6,000 were farmers—were given electric power during the past year.

Cattlemen had a big day at Oakville during the week when a Canadian record average of \$1,257 for a consignment sale was established. Seventy-five head of choice Holsteins from Canada's best herds went for a total of \$94,305. The top price was \$3,100 paid by R. H. McLaughlin of Lanark, Ont., for Glenafon Rag Apple Alert, a fine three-year-old bull consigned by J. J. McCague of Alliston, Ont. A total of 28 head sold for \$1,000 or more each, these included a six-year-old cow bought by H. J. McFarlane, Picton, from W. A. Hodge, St. Laurent, Que. for \$4,000.

RECORD BREAKING HOLSTEIN SALE AT OAKVILLE

The second annual All-Canadian Holstein Sale held November 9th at Oakville resulted in the establishment of a new Canadian average for a Holstein consignment sale of \$1,257, the 75 head sold bringing a total of \$94,305. The previous record average of \$1,037 was made at the 1943 All-Canadian Sale, also held at Oakville.

Local breeders took a prominent part both as buyers and sellers. A. G. Hunter, Freeman, paid \$1,500 for an eight-month-old son of the noted Montvie Rag Apple Markman, consigned by C. J. Cawwell, Beeton. He is Bond Haven Rag Apple Hartog, J. W. and E. H. Carney, Georgetown, received \$1,025 and \$775 for a pair of five-year-old cows. The former went to Undilla Farm, Chadwick, Illinois, and the latter to D. L. Mayne, Rochester, N. Y. Elmer Carney, Georgetown, received \$1,000 for a year-old heifer that went to Barton Miller, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., while W. S. Hall, Oakville, secured \$750 for a three-year-old heifer, Harold Bingham, Georgetown, \$575 for a three-year-old, Dr. Chas. N. Blamhard, Freeman, \$500 for a two-year-old and E. Segsworth, Freeman, \$400 for a two-year-old. Fred H. McLaughlin, Norval, bought a baby bull calf for \$50.
