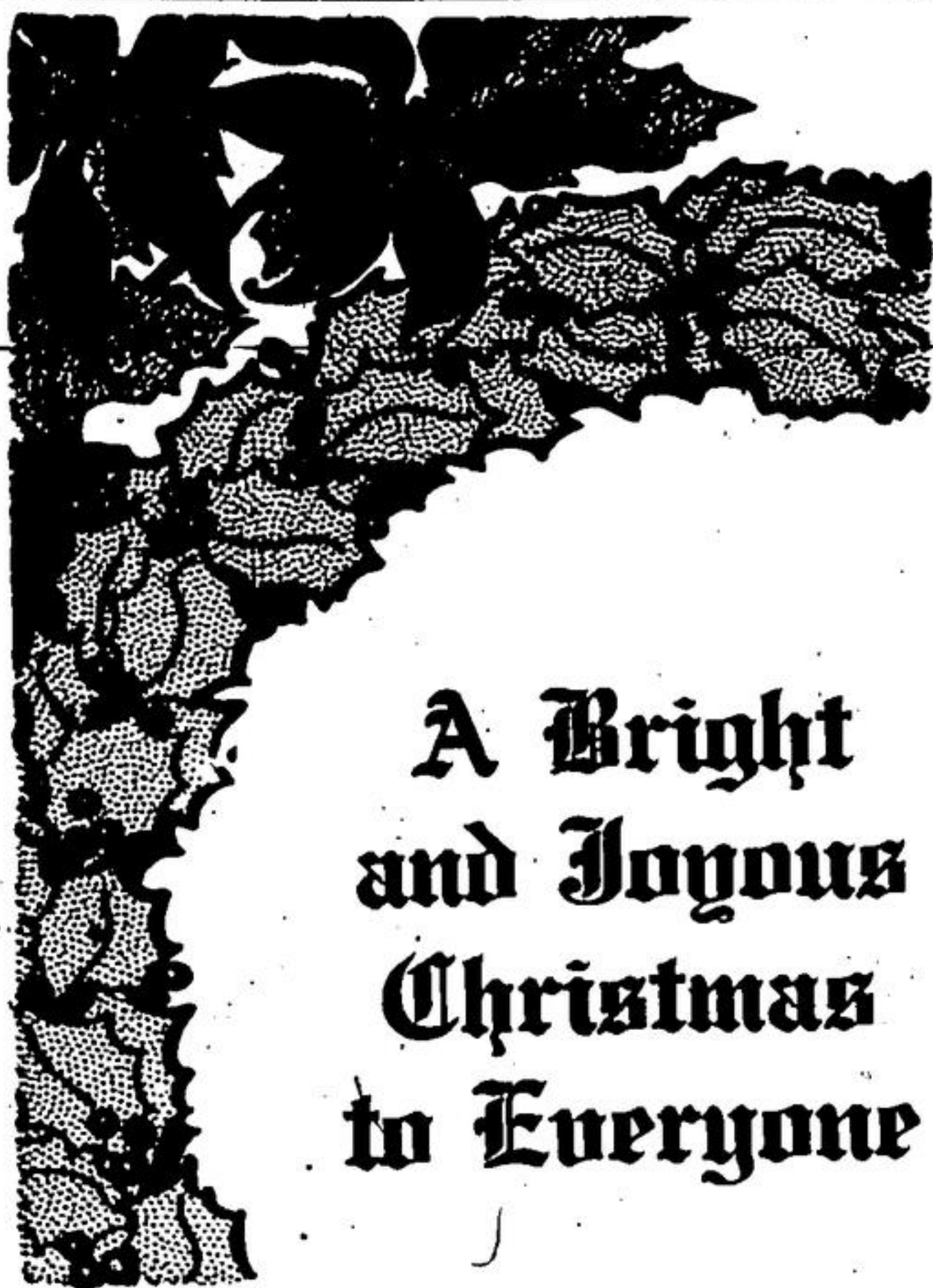

With a Township bounty in Eramosa of \$35 per head supplemented with a \$25 Provincial bounty, wolves in this district are pretty profitable game for hunters. On Wednesday Wellington and Arthur Stumph bagged a wolf on the farm of Reeve D. D. Gray of Eramosa, just north of Rockwood.

In view of the fact that Eramosa has paid this year over \$1000 in claims for sheep killed, the bounty on a wolf is pretty good business at \$35. It is believed a number of the sheep killed were the prey of wolves.

County Council Lauds Work of Warden for 1944

Committee Appointed to Investigate Health Service for Rural Schools—Allowances Made Old Age Pensions Secretary and to Road Engineer—Other Items at Concluding Session Monday

The final meeting of the 1944 County Council was held in Milton last Monday. The Warden presided but two of the members—Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Hillmer were absent.

Business was brief and to the point. Communications and minutes were read and reports considered in Committee of the whole.

Business arising from the same was as follows: Moved by C. H. Heslop, seconded by W. J. Robertson, that a grant of \$150 be given to the Road Engineer on account of increase in gas and oil expenses.—Carried.

There was some discussion in regard to the advertising for the County booklet for overseas and in this connection it was moved by Mr. Craig, seconded by J. M. McDonald, that the interim report of the advertising committee be accepted and the following committee fees be paid, N. Craig, \$8.60; J. M. McDonald, \$8.40; N. Gilbert, \$7.60.—Carried.

Moved by N. Craig, seconded by J. Blair, that Wm. Deans, as secretary of the Old Age Pensions and Mothers' Allowance Board be given a grant of \$150 for efficient services rendered to the Board.—Carried.

Moved by J. Blair, seconded by N. Craig, that the following accounts be passed and authorized for payment: Finance, \$2045.65; County Buildings, \$490.47; Printing, \$123.51; Hospital Accounts, \$350.50; Agriculture and Reforestation, \$63.20; Total \$3073.63.—Carried.

The question of a health service in

the rural schools was again discussed and it was agreed that Messrs. J. M. McDonald, W. J. Robertson and C. Hillmer be a committee to go to the Department to investigate the setup of the school nurse plan.

Routine business being completed the Warden was asked to vacate the chair when Mr. J. M. McDonald acted as Chairman. It was moved by J. Blair and seconded by J. M. Campbell, that the thanks of this council be tendered to our Warden, Mr. Howard May, for the courteous and efficient manner in which he presided over the deliberations of this council, and the prompt attention given to the business during the year.—Carried.

Following the motion each member of the council present at Monday's meeting expressed his—or her—personal appreciation of the Warden's courtesy and efficiency during his year of office. Mr. Wes Murray, Deputy Reeve of Esqueving, while quite in agreement with the good record shown by the Warden, said he did not expect anything less from a man from Esqueving Township.

The Warden thanked the members for their words of commendation and goodwill and also expressed his appreciation of the good work done by all county council officials without whose co-operation his year of office would have been a lot more difficult. He expressed regret that more work had not been accomplished during his tenure of office but hoped that all those interested would realize short-ages of labor and materials made progress along some lines almost impossible. He particularly regretted the bridge at Glen Williams had not been constructed while he was in office.

No other business being brought before the council the meeting adjourned with the singing of the National Anthem closing another business year for the County of Halton.

Reeve May Thanked for Courteous Treatment and Conduct of Council Proceedings

The last regular meeting of Esqueving Township Council for the year was held on Friday. Deputy Reeve G. W. Murray, Councillors George E. Cleave, George Currie and Wm. A. Wilson were present and Reeve C. H. May presided.

Accounts passed for payment included: Dept. Game and Fisheries, hunting licenses, \$25.00; Corporation of Georgetown, Division Court costs and rent, \$18.00; Bell Telephone Co., services, \$4.95; Acton Public Utilities, Crescent lights, \$15.00; W. J. Campbell, Wood Inspector, \$10.00; George Town Herald, account, \$24.69; Cecil Chisholm, attending court of appeals, \$8.35; A. W. Benton attending court, \$5.60 and stamps \$10.25; J. Sanford, relief account, supplies, etc., \$19.63; G. C. Brown, insurance renewal, \$37.50.

Board of Health accounts for meetings and mileage were paid: J. H. Bingham, \$26.70; Dr. R. T. Paul, \$25.20; C. H. May, \$28.80; I. M. Bennett, \$24.00; Dept. of Health, Inault, 40c; J. Sanford, \$13.52.

Members of Council received the following amounts for meetings, mileage and commission: C. H. May, \$160.80; G. W. Murray, \$150.00; G. E. Cleave, \$132.50; Geo. Currie, \$134.40; Wm. A. Wilson, \$134.40.

At the afternoon session of Council the by-law providing for the holding of municipal nominations and elections was read and passed. Road accounts of \$4,905.25 were passed for payment; legal fees of Dale & Bennett of \$150.00 were paid, and relief accounts of \$14.75.

Sheep claims included amounts to Stanley May, \$11.00; Spencer Hughes, valuator, \$2.00; Wm. A. Wilson, \$85.00; F. W. Shortill, valuator, \$2.00.

Mr. K. C. Lindsay was paid \$25.00 for services rendered regarding the county book.

At the conclusion of the meeting the Reeve vacated the chair and the Deputy Reeve G. W. Murray, put the following motion:

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Cleave, that the thanks of this Council are hereby tendered to Reeve, C. H. May for the courteous and impartial manner in which he has presided over the meetings of this Council during the past year.—Carried.

Cases Heard In Court In Milton This Week

In Police Court in Milton yesterday afternoon Arthur Clibine pleaded guilty to a charge of careless driving and was fined \$25 and costs. The case arose from a collision of a truck owned by Gordon Snow and driven by Arthur Clibine and a car driven by Thomas Epstein, of Toronto. The accident occurred on December 2nd on the First Line of Esqueving.

Evidence showed that at the time of the mishap the windshield of the truck was nearly all frosted. The truck struck the front of the car, damaging the front fender and running board, amounting to \$114. There was no damage to the truck. Provincial Constable E. R. Lemon investigated.

On Monday at a special sitting of Court before Judge Munro, Thomas Burmum of Hamilton appeared on a charge of stealing a car and tires. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to a year in the reformatory on each charge, the terms to run concurrently.
