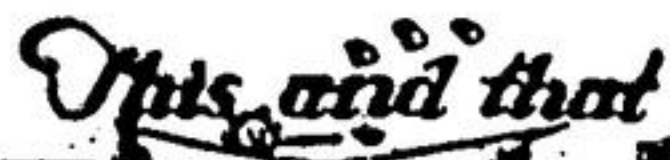

PUBLIC BECOMING MORE CONSCIOUS OF NEED OF INSULATION

Mr. T. Kenny, chief engineer for the Gilpin Insulation Company called at our office this week to leave an advertisement which appears elsewhere in the Press. Mr. Kenny informs us that Canadians seem to be becoming more and more insulation conscious, due to the fuel shortage, and that the comfort obtained by insulating; and that the Gilpin Company are one of the oldest in the business, and have a list of customers, whose houses they have insulated, that looks like a Who's Who of prominent Canadians. Some of the names he quotes of local interest included Alfred O. Beardmore, 6 Strathairn Road, Toronto and Col. A. O. Beardmore, 22 Dunvegan Road, Toronto. These contracts were done by Gilpin in March 1934, and December 1937, respectively.

NEW DIRECTORY FOR ACTON HAS MANY CHANGES IN LISTINGS

The Smiths may thrive in Guelph, but they don't do so well in Acton. This conclusion is reached after a study of the new telephone directory for Galt, Kitchener, Guelph and vicinity, which is now being mailed to local subscribers.

Easily first in the Guelph section are the Smiths, with 62 listings. In Acton there are no outstanding common names, thus making it easier to consult the directory. There are only two Smiths listed.

According to J. I. Sanderson, Bell Telephone manager in this area there are more than 6,800 listings now and changed since the last issue, including a number in the Acton list.

In view of the large number of changes, Mr. Sanderson expressed the hope that subscribers would consult the new directory carefully before placing calls, and make corrections to desk lists and memo pads.
