Extension of Water Mains --- Planning For Sewerage

Health gave Council the information that no ratepayer could compel the Council to instal watermains in any section.

Council discussed the program necessary to acquaint the public with the proposed installation of sewerage system. The Clerk was instructed to contact the Department of Public Health and see if a speaker would come to Acton and address a public meeting. It was felt that now the spring months were here, action should be taken to acquaint the public with the plans.

Quotations and samples of a police uniform were received from local dealers. It was decided to purchase the uniform from the sample submitted by Wm. Cooper at a cost of \$46, including two pair of trousers and no vest.

The Fire Brigade put in a requisition for 300 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose and 100 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and a controllable nozzle for 1 1/2 inch hose. Complaint was also made that the nozzle purchased last year was not suitable.

It was decided to purchase 300 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose and 100 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and controllable nozzle for 1 1/2 inch hose of 12 threads to the inch from Dunlop Tire & Rubber Co. and that the Fire Brigade make a written application for these supplies.

The by-law providing for levying for expenditure of the Municipality was read as required and passed by Council.

Chief Harrop reported that 13 trees on Cameron Street had been trimmed and there were 9 more to complete the work.

Another barrel of roofing material was to be secured for the arena roof. A week's holiday with pay was granted Mr. Clifford.

The County Grader was to be secured for use in April.

It was reported to Council that a passageway had been cut through the seats in the arena from the curling rink.

The drainage on Park Avenue was discussed and it was deemed advisable to construct a drain in this section. Quotations were to be received on the tile.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO, March 28 (CP) - The bubbling cauldron of Ontario politics boiled over and the province faced its second general election in two years. No date has yet been set for the election, sequel to the 51-38 defeat of the Progressive Conservative government on a C. C. F. amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne. It was the first time in the history of Ontario that a government had lost on a want-of-confidence vote.

The C. C. F. amendment on which the government went down to defeat said the government's attitude had not assisted in bringing about national unity, that the government had failed to implement election promises with respect to education, health services and other matters, that the government failed to forecast legislation which would ensure adequate prices for farm produce, that the government had failed to recognize the need for legislation to provide union security and collective bargaining right after the war, and that the government had failed to recognize the need sources of Ontario to guarantee post-war employment for servicemen and war workers.

Premier Drew said the government had "crumbled under the most difficult circumstances and under the most severe provocation." By every possible device, each of the opposition groups impeded the business of the legislature and made it impossible to proceed with important government business.

C. C. F. Leader E. B. Joffe said "The present political crisis was deliberately engineered by Premier Drew. Ever since last summer he has zealously followed a course which he knew could not be accepted by the opposition majority in the legislature."

Mitchell Hepburn, Liberal leader, said Mr. Drew's action was "a flagrant disregard of all the decencies of parliamentary behaviour and the constitutional rights of the people of this province through their parliament."

When the 51 members of the opposition groups voted the government into defeat, they did so at what could amount to a cost of more than \$1,400 apiece. Seasonal indemnity is \$2,000 a member, providing the legislature sits 30 days. When the session falls short of that duration members are paid \$20 a day and so far the house has sat only 26 days since it opened February 15. Thus the total for each member comes to \$520.

Attorney-General Leslie Blackwell said the matter of seasonal indemnities was in the hands of Provincial Treasurer Leslie Frost, who would decide the basis of payment after consultation with the attorney-general.
