#### TREND FROM DAIRY PARMING IN WEST

Changes are taking place in Western Canada in connection with the production of dairy products, which may produce significant results, states the latest issue of the Quarterly Bulletin of Agricultural Statistics. The profitable grain crop harvested in 1944 has already caused farmers in the Prairie Provinces to retreat from dairying to some extent. On some farms, dairy herds are being reduced and plans are under way for the use of a larger number of cows for beef production, so that less layout will be

This movement is just beginning to emerge and its effect on Mairying is already in evidence. The consequences of this competition cannot be definitely placed at this stage, says the Bulletin, but they promise to show up to a much greater degree during the winter period, and may have a marked effect on the production of milk and other manufactured products in the summer of 1945.
