According to the Tax Collection By-law a penalty of Two per cent. will be added on the amount remaining unpaid after the Sixteenth day of April until the Fifteenth Day of June; and an addition of Four per cent. on the First Instalment remaining unpaid after the Fifteenth Day of June. This penalty applies to each instalment in a similar manner.
