Dr. I N. Asheshov and his assistant, Miss Freda Strelitz, German-horn laboratory technician, are working on a new organism, Aspergillus Fumigatus, a member of the recently-discovered aspergillum family. This family of organisms has already produced drugs which kill streptococcic and staphyococcic germs. Dr. Asheshov says the drug he has developed from this family kills tubercule bacilli in the test tube and there were indications it might prove effective in treating animals and humans afflicted with tuberculosis.
