AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that such appeals must be by notice in writing in the prescribed form, signed by the complainant IN DUPLICATE and given to the Clerk of the Revising Officer or left for him at his address as stated above.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the Voters' Lists to be revised are those of the several municipalities in the said County of Halton, as revised by the County Judge or certified by the Clerk of the Peace in the year 1944. An appeal should be made for anyone entitled to vote whose name does not appear in Part I or Part III of the said Voters' Lists.
