ANTHONY ALLISON

At the Guelph General Hospital on Sunday, May 5th, Anthony Allison passed away suddenly in his 89th year following an illness of nearly two years. Born in the township of Nassagaweya, near the village of Moffat, he was the second eldest son of the late Robert and Margaret Allison. On Dec. 22, 1855 he was married to Martha Ramsey and they farmed in Nassagaweya until they retired and moved to Eden Mills 15 years ago. His wife predeceased him 13 years ago. Mr. Allison was a member of Ebenezer and Eden Mills United Churches.

Surviving are two brothers, John of Millgrove and George of Padlackwood, Saak. The funeral was held from the home of his niece, Mrs. Frank Hathaway, Moffat, his pastors Rev. R. W. Pickeringill and Rev. C. L. Poole, officiating. Interment was in Ebenezer Cemetery.

ALBERT E. LAING

Burlington, Vermont

Many friends in this community will regret to learn of the death of Albert E. Laing of Burlington, Vermont and we glean the following item from the Daily Free Press of that city:

Albert E. Laing, 78, superintendent of the Vermont Anti-Saloon League for over 25 years, was found dead in bed Thursday morning, April 26th, at his home 189 Church St. Burlington. For more than a quarter of a century, Mr. Laing was superintendent of the Vermont Anti-Saloon League with its headquarters at 188 Main St. He edited the publication, "The Issue" during this time.

He visited Protestant churches throughout the state, speaking on the temperance issue and keeping parishioners informed of the temperance program and situation in reference to licenses. Following each of these talks he would take up a collection which assisted with the finances of the organization. He called his organization "An Alliance of the Churches in Behalf of Temperance."

Mr. Laing's primary interest was with the churches but he also spoke in high schools and before clubs. For many years he served as legislative counsel in behalf of the Vermont Anti-Saloon League at the state legislature in Montpelier.

Born in Glenshee, Canada, February 25, 1867 he was a member of the First Methodist Church in Burlington and of the official board. He was also a member of the Gideons.

He is survived by one brother, Arthur Laing and one nephew, Clarence Laing, both of Toronto; and one sister-in-law, Mrs. Ralph Reed of Haverhill, N. H. Interment was in the family lot in Lake View Cemetery.

GUELPH PRESBYTERIAL RALLY OF W. M. S. OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

A rally of Guelph Presbyterial Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was held on Tuesday, May 8th in Knox Church Acton.

Mrs. Angus Lindsay of Elora, president of the Presbyterial, presided. Members were present from St. Andrew's, Guelph, Knox, Guelph; St. Paul's, Guelph; Campbellville, Nassagaweya, Paisley Block, Duff's, Paisley, Rockwood, Eden Mills, Elmira, Elora, Ferguson, Hespeler and Acton.

Words of welcome were given by Mrs. E. J. Hassard, of Acton. A short worship service, in charge of Guelph Presbytery, was conducted by Rev. Dr. W. J. McVoy, acting moderator. Mrs. W. P. Gamble, of Guelph, honorary president of Presbyterial, had charge of the closing devotions. Both gave a message very fitting for the memorable day: one of thanksgiving, intercession and re-dedication.

Impressions of the Ontario Provincial meeting were given by Mrs. MacFarlane, of Fortuna, Mrs. Lindsay, of Elora, Mrs. Mainprize, of Acton. A helpful discussion hour was conducted by the President.

W. C. Millward Chosen Provincial C.C.F. Candidate

Prof. Grube Speaker at Convention in Milton Theatre Last Wednesday

William Cecil Millward, Burlington was unanimously chosen C.C.F. provincial candidate for Halton riding at a convention held last week in Milton. An electrician with a large rubber company, Mr. Millward was born of United Empire Loyalist stock on his father's farm near Grimby in 1900. He operated a farm near Winona for a number of years.

Speaking of the accomplishments of Canada's first CCF government, the candidate declared that the Saskatchewan government, although it was ninety per cent farmers has passed the most advanced labor legislation on the North American continent. "They know, as we know, that the interests of all the people are best served when farmers and labor work together as they do in the CCF," he said.

Other names placed before the convention were Robert Duncan, of Oakville, Dorothy McDonald, of Bronte, Andrew Elliott, of Milton, and John Wilkinson, of Burlington. Each declined. The meeting pledged full support to Mr. Millward.

George M. A. Grube, president of the Ontario CCF reviewed events leading up to George Drew's sudden dissolution of the Ontario Legislature and branded as "childish" the juggling of election dates for supposed "party advantage." "Don't let Drew fool you," he warned. "He would like to give the impression he is sure of winning in Ontario and it will influence a favorable Conservative vote in the rest of Canada." "Drew will be lucky if he wins his own seat," the speaker continued, "and as for the federal, everyone knows there is no Conservative party in the rest of Canada."

Mr. Grube declared, "It makes little difference to the CCF when an election is called because our policies are formulated at regular conventions where everyone has a voice and vote. They are not pulled out of a hat by a party autocrat to fizzle the voters at election time as were Drew's 22 points and Hepburn's new book of promises."

"The government's so-called educational reforms turned out to be nothing more than a token measure of tax relief," the speaker said, "and did nothing to equalize educational opportunity for the children of the province. On the contrary, these scraps in actual practice followed the old Conservative policy of the 'who has most, gets most.'"

Carlyle C. Browne, federal CCF nominee for Halton deplored the tactics used by the "old parties" in the last election. He warned his audience to be on guard against "the lies that may again be spread in the coming campaign." He recalled how farmers were told that the CCF would take their farms away from them but this bogey was crushed forever when the farmers of Saskatchewan voted a CCF government into power. "Can you imagine a government composed largely of farmers passing legislation to take their own farms away from themselves?" he asked. "The CCF policy of security on individually owned farms has been repeatedly stated by Mr. Coldwell and other CCF leaders and has been approved by conventions all across Canada. The monopolistic industries which the CCF believes must come under government ownership are those which if the government does not control them, they control the government," Mr. Browne declared.

John Wilkinson, of Burlington, and Scott McKay, of Oakville, spoke briefly on organization work. Robert Duncan, of Oakville, president of the Halton CCF Riding Association, acted as chairman of the meeting which was attended by more than 300 delegates from all parts of the riding.

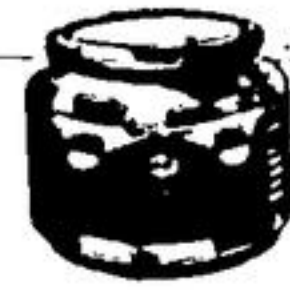
ELK PROTECTED BY SWEDISH LAW

STOCKHOLM (CP)—According to statistics, 9,662 elk were shot in Sweden during 1944 compared with 12,236 in 1943. The elk, largest beast roaming the vast pine forests of the north, is protected by law, and elk hunting, favorite sport of Swedish game hunters, is allowed for only about one week in the autumn.

During the war the Swedish elk stock has been heavily taxed, as elk meat is not included in the rather scanty meat rationing and has therefore brought high prices. Thus the number of elk has decreased in southern Sweden, whereas a slight increase in the stock is reported in the northernmost provinces.
