Obituary

H. D. RAMSHAW, Detroit

Many Acton readers of *The Free Press* regretted to learn of the death of Mr. H. D. Ramshaw on May 26th. Mr. Ramshaw was motoring from Detroit with his son to attend the funeral of his niece Miss Bertha Speight in Acton. At London, Ont., he became ill and was taken to Victoria Hospital there where he passed away a few days later. He was in his seventy-ninth year.

H. D. (Hollie) Ramshaw was born in Acton a son of the late Wilson Ramshaw and Mary Easton. For many years he conducted the photography gallery on Mill Street, now part of Barr's grocery store, and many a family photograph in this locality carries the name in gilt letters on the mounting "H. Ramshaw, Acton." In 1903 he went to Detroit, Mich., and established in that city the Ramshaw Photo Service, the first 24-hour service for photo films to be established in that city. The pioneer establishment was carried on until the time of his death at 8955 Birchwood Avenue.

Mr. Ramshaw was a member of Grace Methodist Church, Detroit. He is survived by two sons, George and Arthur, and one sister, Mrs. Ada Moore of Galt. To all of these sympathies of many friends in this home community goes their bereavement. He never lost touch with the home community and was a regular reader of *The Free Press* in spite of the fact that it is over forty years since he left Acton.

The funeral was held on Thursday, May 31st from his home in Detroit and interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery there.

ARCHIBALD T. MANN

Lifelong resident of this district and a highly-respected citizen Archibald T. Mann passed away on Tuesday of last week in the Guelph General Hospital, after an illness of about two weeks.

Mr. Mann was a son of the late Peter Mann and Annie Moffat, natives of Scotland, and was born on the farm a mile or so east of Acton on No. 7 Highway where he spent all his life. He was a successful farmer and a man who was held in high esteem by a wide circle of friends.

Arch. T. Mann was perhaps best known for his ability and love of music. As a lad of eighteen years he became the precursor in Knox Church here and church history records that it was he who organized the first choir and was the leading spirit in introducing an organ for use in the church services. He was a fine tenor singer and for many years he led the choir in Knox Church. He also in earlier years played in Acton band in local orchestra and gave freely of his time and talent in quartette and solo singing on many occasions. He also served his church in other official capacities as an elder and on various boards, and was a member of the recent honorary Centennial committee. It was a regret to many that his passing came just before the centennial observance of Knox Church on Sunday.

Forty-five years ago he married Miss Mary Moore, who with one sister, Mrs. John Moffat, Toronto, survives him. To them sympathy of many friends goes in their bereavement.

The funeral was held on Thursday afternoon with a private service at the Johnstone & Rumley Funeral Home and a service later in Knox Church where many friends gathered in final tribute to this life they admired so much. The service was in charge of Rev. Forbes Thomson. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton. The pallbearers were his neighbors Messrs. Roy Young, Murray Coles, Jas. Mann, Alex. K. Mann, R. N. Brown and Ninian Lindsay.
