The Tourist and Sunday Gas

In the current discussion regarding the opening of gasoline service stations on Sundays one important factor has been almost entirely overlooked the tourist trade. Since early in the war this has been greatly reduced but a sharp increase can be expected this summer.

This trade is vital to Canada, it constitutes a major "invisible" export to the United States. But it cannot develop properly without Sunday selling of gasoline. There will be little incentive for an American motorist to take a trip through Canada if he faces a dry gas tank over the week-end. Even if he were able to fill up Saturday evening, his mileage during the next 24 hours would be strictly


