motion to that effect. There were only three votes in favor of the motion. Finally it was agreed that means for financing the road work should be further considered.

Mr. J. M. McDonald reported that final arrangements for instituting the County Health Service had been completed, except that office room for clerical work would have to be arranged. Two nurses had been recommended and approved and were all ready to start work beginning with the fall term.

It was moved by J. M. McDonald and Hillmer, that the application of Beta Sutcliffe for the position of senior nurse with Haltom County School Health Service at a salary of \$1,700 per annum with a car allowance of \$600 and with one month's holiday with pay be accepted. Duties to commence August 1, 1945.—Carried.

Moved by Hillmer and McDonald, that the application of Miss A. Gibson for the position of Junior Nurse with Haltom County Health Service at a salary of \$1,400 per annum with a car allowance of \$500 and one month's holiday be accepted. Duties to commence August 15, 1945.—Carried.

Both the above applicants and salaries were recommended by the Provincial Department of Health.

Moved by Murray and K. R. McDonald that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to equalize the assessment for the County of Haltom for the year 1946.—Carried.

This brought up the matter of appointing a county assessor, which the members of the council were supposed to have discussed with their respective councils. When the wardens asked how many were in favor of a county assessor being appointed two were opposed that is Equeasing and Georgetown. Oakville had not reached a definite decision but expected to the following Monday.

Mr. Cleave, deputy-reeve of Equeasing stated he understood that the plan had not worked out very satisfactorily in one of the neighboring counties. For this reason the Warden agreed that inquiries should be made as to the cause of the dissatisfaction before final arrangements were made in Haltom County.

Incidentally, the Treasurer, Miss Margaret Maxted, and the Clerk Mr. W. Deans were appointed to attend the Assessor's Convention in the near future.

For some time past arrangements have been under way to secure a new site for county road machinery and in this connection it was moved by Robertson and Biggar, that we accept the offer of the town of Milton to purchase lot near C. P. R. station for a nominal fee of \$4 as a county yard for the storage of county machinery.—Carried.

Accounts passed were: Finance, \$958.87; County Roads, \$18,993.08; Printing, \$55.32; Agriculture, \$52.35; County Buildings, \$133.42; Hospital Accounts, \$416.00.

No meeting of the council will be held in July. The next meeting is scheduled for August 14 or at the call of the Warden.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO (CP)—Canada went to the polls Monday to elect her 20th parliament and for old Ontario it was the second balloting in eight days.

While Prime Minister Mackenzie King's government was returned to power with 117 seats on the basis of incomplete civilian returns, 47 of Ontario's 82 seats in the House of Commons went to the Progressive-Conservative party.

John Bracken's party increased its representation in the Commons to 65 seats. Liberals won 35 seats in Ontario. The lone C.C.F. member of parliament from Ontario in the last parliament, J. W. Noseworthy, was defeated in York South by Col. A. Cockeram, Progressive Conservative.

While the Dominion picture returned the Liberals to power, the Progressive Conservative party was regarding with satisfaction its victory in Ontario.

The landslide of a week ago brought 74 per cent. of the 90 legislature seats under Premier Drew's banner and cut C. C. F. opposition down to a seven-man group. Progressive Conservative federal campaigners captured approximately 56 per cent. of the province's Common seats in the polling Monday.

The six members of Prime Minister Mackenzie King's cabinet who ran in Ontario ridings, were all returned to power. They are Reconstruction Minister Howe, Port Arthur; State Secretary Martin, Windsor; Air Minister Gibson, Hamilton; Labor Minister Mitchell, Welland; Transport Minister Chevier, Stormont; and Dr. J. McManis, was services minister, who was re-elected in Renfrew South.

The Progressive Conservatives sent back their veterans, too. Gordon Graydon, house leader, won in Peel; Earl Rowe was retained in Dufferin-Simcoe; A. C. Casselman won in Grenville-Dundas; and Mark Senn will again represent Hallandale.

The Progressive Conservatives won 10 of Toronto's 11 seats, taking two of them from Liberal members of the last parliament.

A sidelight of the election, so far as the Dominion's sport devotees were concerned, was the election of Wilfred (Bucko) McDonald, National Hockey League player, to Canada's 20th parliament as Liberal representative for Parry Sound. Defenceman at various periods in his colorful athletic career for Detroit Red Wings, Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Rangers, the 34-year-old member defeated Progressive Conservative and C.C.F. opponents in the northly riding.

HUGHES CLEAVER'S MESSAGE TO ELECTORS

To my Friends in Halton:
I do not want to thank you all. You have worked hard for a good cause and the results which will flow from the victory which you have won will be shared by all.

So far as I am concerned personally I am glad that you saw fit to elect me as there are several tasks which I wanted to see through to a finish. Our public health bill is one of them. Then also I did want to have a share in seeing that our returned men are properly re-established. This country too is on the eve of a large home building program. It has always been a hope of mine that everyone in this country could own his own home. With the National Housing Act the coming years should show substantial results along this line. The problem of the maintenance of consumer buying power at a sufficiently high level to consume our maximum production is another problem in which I am intensely interested and coupled with this, and really part of it, is our agricultural problem. We cannot have a truly prosperous country until our farmers are prosperous. For all of these reasons I take up the task again as your member gratefully and with the hope that my next term at Ottawa will see many of these hopes of mine come to pass.

This penalty applies to each instalment in a similar manner.

Taxes are NOW due and payable. An additional penalty applies on the First Instalment if not paid on or before June 15th and a penalty is applicable to Second Instalment if not paid by June 15th.
