LONDON (CP)-Pamphlets asking the Germans "what do you charge for awimming lessons?" were dropped on ated. the continent by the Royal Air Force Counted Worthy to Suffer when Hitler was preparing to invade Britain.

Subject matter of some of the propaganda leaflets dropped on the enemy from the air has been disclosed following the relaxation of censorship regulations. During the European war propaganda material was strict "security."

One pamphlet called "Marching against England" was divided into three secettans, before, during and after invasion. Some typical questlone were:

Why does not the Fuehrer come stormy; how often must we practise landing? What is the sinte of the ara? We are sea-sirk; where is the bucket? Where is our fleel? Where is the Luftwaffe?

We have had enough; we are still in hospital; where did you get that nice cold, lumbago, pneumonia, nerve shock, 'Please where can I see the list of fatal casualties?

SASKATOON, Sask. (CP)-Saskatchewan flax growers lost \$700,000 helween 1939 and 1944 by failing to disinfect seed, University of Saskatchewan plant pathology officials said they estimated.


A laboratory report said that seed treatment tests during the past three years have shown that treatment with organic mercury dusts at the rate of one ounce per bushel of seed has increased the stand on an average of more than 25 per cent.

Treatment with chemical dusts protect young seedlings from parasites and produced more vigorous plants.
