HALTON FEDERATION PLANS MONTHLY MEETINGS NEXT SEASON

The Halton Federation has signed an agreement with the National Film Board to operate one of their projects with sound equipment in this County for the winter, starting in September.

Twenty points have been chosen in the county where farm groups have agreed to sponsor monthly meetings. In the afternoons a special showing will be made in rural schools by arrangement with the school boards. The Film Board will have a large number of films dealing with a wide range of farm topics as well as home beautification, soil conservation, marketing farm products, Canada's natural resources, etc., and many special films for school children. This educational work cannot be carried on without a full time man. A number of other counties have given leadership in this work and they are most enthusiastic about the results.

There is only a limited amount of this equipment yet available in Ontario and Halton is fortunate in being accepted. Several counties have requested a second unit.
