## Commission Places Order for New Truck at Meeting Monday

### To be Fitted With Suitable Tool Cabinet and Equipped to Meet Needs

A meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission was held on Monday evening. Commissioners C. M. Hansen and J. R. MacArthur were present.

A request by the Wool Warehousing men for light bulbs for the arena was referred to a motion on the books which stated that a written order for supplies for the arena must be produced before parts or electricity would be supplied.

Superintendent Wilson reported that power would be cut off in the South portion of the town and to rural lines South of Acton on Sunday for a short time, while power lines were being changed over, on condition that the preparatory work could be completed by that time.

## Farm Help Needed If Halton Crops Are To Be Saved

In a recent interview with Agriculture Representative, J. E. Whitelock, we were informed that winter situation on Halton farms is as critical at present as at any time during the previous war years. Contrary to the expectations of many, the hay crop in Halton is generally heavy, the same holds true of the winter wheat, and the earlier sown spring grain also promises well. In view of the world shortage of food supplies, the saving of these crops is absolutely essential.

The situation in Halton has been temporarily relieved to some extent by Western Canada farm lands, quite a large number of whom have been placed by the Department office at Milton, Toronto commandos are also being brought out as weather conditions permit and in accordance with the demand. There still remains, however, stated Mr. Whitelock, many farmers in all sections of the County who are badly in need of assistance if their vitally needed crops are to be saved. In short, the help of all able bodied urban dwellers of Halton can be used to advantage, whether it be for an odd half-day, day or part of the holiday period.

## Still Million Pounds of Wool In Acton Arena

There has been a great deal of conjecture and anxiety about when the arena would be clear of wool and back to its intended use for the benefit of Acton and district young people. Council has written about the termination of the lease and all hope it will soon be clear.

This past few days there has been a movement of wool from the building for shipment. We visited the building and found there was an estimated million pounds of wool stored in the Acton arena. It is done up in bales weighing approximately 800 lbs. each and therefore in about 1250 bales.

The whole surface of the curling rink is covered with bales one row deep. Part of the arena ice surface and seating in the south west corner is piled up to the steel girders. The northwest side has a few bales and the centre is clear. Of course the entire storage space used is covered with railway ties and planking. There has also been sections of seating cut through and platforms altered.

The truck plying between the arena and the station carries about ten bales each trip and while we haven't been counting the trips made per day in clearing the wool it doesn't require any mathematics to deduce that there are 125 trips to be made and it could be cleared in less than a month. Council has learned the wool has all been sold. Let's hope the purchaser demands immediate delivery.
