TITAT

1 The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Acton intends to construct as a local improvement water line extensions as follows: 1800 feet northerly on Main Street, 450 feet on Scene Street, 900 feet on Queen Street East, 370 feet on Queen Street West and 270 feet on Alice Street. The Council of the Corporation intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work except such lands as are not directly benefited and which may by annual Act of Council be exempt under Sub-section 1—Section 42 of the Assessment Act. The Council of the Corporation further intends to construct as a local improvement a concrete water reservoir of 50,000 gallons capacity adjacent to the source of the Town water supply.

2 The estimated cost of the work is \$22,000, of which \$20,000 is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage for the water lines is \$1.25. The special assessment for the water lines is to be paid in 15 equal annual instalments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is 7c.

3 Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board, for its approval of the undertaking of the said work and any owner may within twenty-one days after the first publication of this notice file with the Board his objection to the said work being undertaken.

4 The said Board may approve of the said work being undertaken, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the said work will be considered.
