Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Grace at home and Edith with the Canadian Army in Holland; two sons, Arthur and Stanley both farming in Nassagaweya, also five grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon at Ebenezer Church where he had been a lifelong member and for many years secretary-treasurer. Interment was in Ebenezer Cemetery.

Acton friends will indeed regret to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. Anne Wolffsch (Walton), who was before her marriage Miss Anne Martin, of Acton, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Palmer Martin. Mrs. Wolffsch resided at 365 Grace St. Toronto and had gone to the basement of the apartment to do her washing on Monday morning, July 23rd. The other occupants of the home had no occasion to go to the basement until about three o'clock that afternoon, when they went to deliver a phone call to her. She was found lying across a bench and had been dead for about an hour. Fumes from a Ruid heater had escaped and suffocated her. Firemen and an emergency squad from the Gas Company tried to revive her but failed.

Anne Martin was born at the old home in Chinguacousy Township, near Cheltenham. Later the family came to Acton and resided on Church Street. She attended Acton Public and Continuation Schools and taught school for two years in Muskoka district. She then went into training for a nurse at Grace Hospital, Toronto and in 1920 the family moved from Acton to Toronto.

Six years ago she married Irwin Jerry Walton and has been a devoted wife and made many friends in Toronto who mourn with the husband and brothers, the loss sustained. She leaves two brothers Leslie in Aurora and John of Guelph. Her father died in 1932 and her mother in 1940.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday and was in charge of Rev. George Leckheller, pastor of College Street Baptist Church. Many relatives from a distance attended the funeral and many floral tokens conveyed sympathy.

plane. Offices in the area in which the huge aircraft struck were turned into raging infernos by blazing gasoline.

Laval on the Move
In Paris the treason trial of aged Marshal Petain continued as efforts were resumed to apprehend Pierre Laval, former Vichy government chief, from Spain where he took refuge after Germany's collapse. Laval was reported to have surrendered to American authorities in Germany. French airfields were told to be on the lookout for a plane carrying Laval after reports were received that the collaborationist leader had arrived at Bologna, northern Italy. Laval, who has already been condemned to death in absentia by a French provincial court, is scheduled to go on trial before August 8th.

Across the Channel, John E. Amery, 33, son of L. S. Amery, former British secretary of state for India, was committed for trial in London on high treason charges after courts heard testimony that he had tried to persuade British prisoners of war and civilian internees in France to fight for Hitler against Russia. Two internees testified Amery had visited their camp and offered them freedom if they would don German uniforms to fight the Russians. Amery was quoted as saying he was working for a committee in England and that 1,500 men had already joined the "Legion of St. George" from prisoner of war camps in Germany.

Observers in Potsdam predicted the latest Big Three conference would end by Thursday at the latest and it was announced that President Truman will fly to Portsmouth, England, that day to meet King George aboard the British battle cruiser Renown. The president, accompanied by Secretary of State Byrnes and Admiral Leahy, will have luncheon with the King. King George will be accompanied by Lord Halifax, British ambassador to the United States; Sir Alan Lascelles, private secretary to the King; and Capt. Sir Harold Campbell. Queen Elizabeth will not accompany the King.

THIS WEEK

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's first major labor dispute since the conclusion of the war in Europe appeared near settlement when Canada Packers agreed to a union proposal that a three-man commission be asked to arbitrate differences over a union agreement.

An estimated 5,300 members of the United Packinghouse Workers of America (U.P.W.A.) were out on strike in Toronto, Peterborough, Ont., Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver and an estimated 1,200 union employees in one Saskatoon and six Winnipeg plants owned by other companies voted to strike Thursday in sympathy with their co-workers.

Mr. Justice S. E. Richards, chairman of a commission which drew up an agreement between the union and the three major meat packing companies Canada Packers, Swift Canadian and Pat Burns was asked to preside over the new commission agreed on by company and union to arbitrate the dispute.

The original strike started in five Toronto plants of Canada Packers, Ltd., when 1,800 workers left their jobs July 21, after a disagreement which started July 17 when the union asked the company to transfer a worker from the beef-packing plant. The Toronto meat packing plant. The request was refused. General strike action followed.

Daily pay loss to the workers is estimated at \$12,000 and Canada Packers officials estimate that weekly loss in production should all company strikes last seven days, would be 9,420,000 pounds of meat.

Toronto chain store officials expressed fear that the city might suffer a meat shortage within a few days if the dispute were not settled.

The Ontario Department of Planning and Development is laying the basis for what it hopes will be an unprecedented expansion of business between Britain and the province. Dr. George Langford, department director, said in a statement following his return from a visit to the United Kingdom. Dr. Langford said Ontario will share considerably in the expected branching out of many British manufacturers. Results of his department's services would be seen when conditions permit active steps being taken by overseas firms.

Indicative of British industrialists' interest in Ontario and Dominion enterprises was the recent purchase of British interests of the Canadian government-owned, Victory Aircraft plant at Malton, Ont. Many aviation experts believe the Dominion will become the aircraft production centre of the Empire within the next decade. Factors supporting this contention are the proximity of Canadian industry to sources of raw materials and Canada's position on the aerial map which makes ready delivery of the completed plane to any part of the world feasible.

Premier George Drew and eight of his cabinet ministers will head a 35-man delegation to the Dominion-provincial conference scheduled to open August 6th, in Ottawa. Each province, together with a Dominion government representative, will be represented on four committees to be created to handle the business of the conference. Each minister will be accompanied by officials of his department including his deputy minister. The conference is expected to last a week to 10 days.
