PEACE AT LAST. WITH VICTORY

Japan Surrenders Tuesday Local Celebrations are Held

August 14th, 1945, ranks with May 7th, 1945 as a date that blazed on the historic calendar of the world. Official word rame to the world at 7 o'clock Tureday night that Japan, the last enemy in the second World War had accepted the Allied surrender terms and the Great War had ended

Orders have gone out to stience the guns that have blazed for six years. The days of the past week have been days of anxious waiting. The use of the atomic bomb and the entry of Russia against Japan were the final blows that brought the Japa to submission. Announcements over the week-end came thick and fast and all pointed to the end drawing hourly The culmination came on Tuesday evening at seven o'clock, when everyone drew a deep sigh of relief and then each to his own way, proceeded to celebrate.

Then the crowd joined in to make its own parade. They sang, held up traffic, if necessary, but were all orderly and did no damage just celebrated when the time was ripe for such joyousness. A dance on the street was rained out, but assembled in the Town Hall and had a full evening of fun.
