

SOUTH AFRICANS SPENT LAVISHLY

BRIGHTON (CP) - South African soldiers, released from prison camps on the continent spent about 1,000,000 pounds (about \$4,500,000) during a four months stay in Brighton since their repatriation

"We spend money just the same way as you or anyone else would who had been cooped up in a German camp for a year or two," said one of the 8,000 South Africans who were here." All but 2,000 of these former prisoners have since returned to South Africa.
