FUTURE BRIGHT FOR TROPICAL COUNTRIES
LONDON (CP)—There is no reason why the tropics should not be healthy to live in, Dr. G. MacDonald told the Ross Institute of Tropical Hygiene of which he is director. He forecast a prosperous future for equatorial countries if war-developed methods of disease control were implemented in the peace years.
In the Nile Valley, Dr. MacDonald said, complete eradication of malaria was being attempted and if successful the "whole picture of life in Upper Egypt would be revolutionized and the country enter on a period of prosperity such as it has not known for thousands of years."
Repetition of the process would be possible in other places, particularly in island territories infested with the same species of mosquitoes. Malaria control, he said, was one of the boasts of the British Eighth Army, and the principles they used could be used to advantage in peace.
Another disease which the war had helped eliminate was dysentery and Dr. MacDonald said "sulphur" drugs would ease the ravages of this malady in the future. "Flat control" which became a study in the Far East had also advanced to such a stage that typhus was being beaten.

SASKATOON (CP)—Contract for construction of a vegetable oil plant, first stage in a Saskatchewan Co-operative Producers' \$2,500,000 project for utilizing of western farm products, was announced by A. F. Sproule, vice-president of the organization.
