Dear Sir:
To my mind, the exhibition of model yachts as arranged for the Acton Fall Fair by the Boys' Hobby Club was a real novelty. I am told that most of the boys attending the club last spring took to the most difficult of tasks as a starter - that of building model boats. What we saw of them at the Fall Fair was an eye-opener.

This week's issue of the Free Press lays stress on the necessity of raising funds for recreation purposes for the younger members of the community. If the older members of the community will only lend their active support to both the Hobby Club and the recreation idea much can be offset which we would all like to see abolished.

In Acton we have no department in the Continuation School for manual training as a permit, for the time being, will not permit. However, I am told that one of the supporters of the Hobby Club has been assured by Col. Drew, the Minister of Education, that Provincial support will be forthcoming along educational lines for the Hobby Club as soon as certain standards have been reached. I believe this can be accomplished this fall. The same organization can then put their weight behind the athletic scheme for the summer months, and I understand they will.
